A Process of Becoming

his summer, several vestry members asked some non-Episcopalian friends to look through our website and give feedback. Their comments were overwhelmingly positive about the content and how beautifully its organized and made accessible to the curious. (Cue cheers for Director of Communications Robyn Banks!) But several asked what the term "Christian Formation" meant. We try to keep our peculiar terms to a minimum, especially in our communication with people who might not be used to talk of narthexes and lectors and cassocks and such. But, in this case, we didn't immediately exchange "formation" for "education" in all our publications. Because there was some intentionality behind the word choice.

Formation suggests something more than the transfer of information into a person's head. Formation suggests a process of becoming. Becoming wiser or kinder or more generous or loving or curious or attentive to the world and people around us. Christian Formation suggests the whole person is being formed a little more fully into who God made that person to be.

Such is the goal of Christian Formation at Calvary. In these pages, you'll find an overview of some of the offerings planned for this fall. There are book studies and Bible studies. Confirmation classes for youth and for adults, Godly Play and choirs for kids, Wednesdays@ Calvary, EYC (Episcopal Youth Community) gatherings, guest speakers at Sunday Forums and much more. We'll gather in these ways on Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings, but also at other times throughout the week, mostly in person, but occasionally online in hopes that everyone who wants one can find their place.

I hope you'll find a small group, or class, or activity or two in which your soul might be nourished and expanded this fall. I also hope that an image, not only of individuals, but of a whole community being formed in the ways of Jesus begins to take shape. Because our goal is not that we assume just any old pleasing form, but that together we become a fuller, clearer expression of the body of Christ, for the sake of a world that's never been in greater need of his ways, his presence, his love.

This session will consider relational dynamics of the "kingdom of God," the central metaphor of Jesus' message, as portrayed in the

Gospels. Christians in positions of cultural dominance have often envisioned the kingdom of God as a territory that his followers should build or enlarge. Jesus, by contrast, described a realm of God's justice and love that his disciples were invited to receive as a gift, enter in a child-like posture, and accept as a reality

within and among them. The session will challenge imperialistic patterns of Christian engagement in the world. In place of a zero-sum approach to building the kingdom of God, it will explore a missional "math" of mutuality and care.

When writer Kathleen Norris returned to church after decades away, the language of Christianity was a barrier. "Judgment," "sinner," "dogma," "salvation," were all part of the faith's "scary vocabulary." Norris's wrestling with those words became a book that's remained in print for more than 20 years. Each week, a short chapter (2-3 pages) from Amazing Grace: A Vocabulary of Faith will provide the theme, to which we may add an online article, a poem, or who knows what else (we call these additions "gleanings") as discussion fodder.

Children and Youth Formation Opportunities

Sunday Mornings 9:15 - 10:15 a.m.

Nursery Care

Ages o-5

Calvary maintains an excellent nursery facility staffed by trained, professional caregivers. Nursery Manager Robbie Phillips and Cassandra Booker welcome children ages o-5. The nursery is open from 7:30 a.m. until 12 p.m. on Sundays. Nursery families are asked to commit to supporting the health, wellness, and safety protocols, and must agree to keep children home when they are not feeling well, have COVID-like symptoms, or have been potentially exposed. Masks are required for children ages two and up, as recommended by the CDC. A loving atmosphere, personal attention, and age-appropriate toys and activities are all designed to make the nursery a safe, nurturing place for your child.

A child registration form should be on file for each child who attends the nursery. Child registration forms can be obtained from Miss Robbie and are kept in a secure location. Please remember to bring diapers/pull-ups and wipes with your child every time they attend the nursery. Please also bring a change of clothing with your child, even if your child is potty-trained.

Children's Formation Classes

Ages 3 through grade 5

Children ages 3 through 5th grade are invited to the Children's wing on the second floor. Our young people will be exploring their faith and scripture through Godly Play and Weaving God's Promises, two curriculums based in storytelling designed to connect our young people deeper to their faith.

We are doing everything we can to keep our folks safe and healthy, and we ask you help support us in this mission. Please keep children home when they are not feeling well, have COVID-like symptoms, or have been potentially exposed. Our formation guides and classrooms will be following protocol as set by Shelby County Schools, and

masks will be required for anyone over the age of two.

On Sundays that our young people are called to choir rehearsals, formation will look a little different. Those folks who do not go to choir will all gather in one space for fellowship and mission activities led by Director of Children and Family Ministries Jeremy Demarest with help from the formation guides.

Rite 13

Grades 6-8

Rite13 creates a safe space for middle school youth to explore new ideas and interests using thought-provoking, fun activities, reflection, and discussion. Youth will engage with Bible study, prayer, and service opportunities to explore their faith.

Journey to Adulthood (J2A)

Grades 9-12

J2A focuses on critical thinking and responsibility while fostering a connection to the Christian community. During Sunday formation, youth will explore new ways of engaging with scripture and prayer.

The Boys and Girls Choir, made up of students with unchanged voices in grades 3 and up, sings at the 10:30 a.m. worship service. Using the *Voice for Life* curriculum established by the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM), Organist-Choirmaster Kristin Lensch promotes a complete and quality approach to children's music ministry that is as much a Christian education experience as it is musical training experience. Choristers often

become peer leaders over time as they progress through the program. Rehearsal is Wednesdays from 6:15 to 7 p.m. At 7, choristers will go to the chancel to say Compline until 7:15. For Fall 2021, masks are required, and we will rehearse distanced in the Crook Auditorium.


Calvary Ringers

The Negro Spiritual serves as one of America's most influential and distinctive musical achievements. Inspired by the harsh and cruel conditions of enslaved people, Spirituals were created and employed to comfort, inform, and to celebrate lived experiences. Spirituals have since provided inspiration for future generations to combat the atrocities of social injustice. In an effort to reimagine social justice, Gavin Wigginson is now employing the songs of his ancestors to inspire new thinking

on what social justice could be for our country and the world. Spiritual Reflections will explore the tragedies of social injustice through the lens of Spirituals and Folk Songs that have been arranged by 20th and 21st Century Black Composers. Each song will be preceded by a reading and a reflective pause to honor victims. Gavin serves as the concert choir director and instructor of applied voice at LeMoyne-Owen College, and as a fellowship coach with the Memphis Music Initiative.

Basement Church

Serve our neighbors experiencing homelessness a delicious breakfast and provide them with an opportunity to select much-needed clothes and toiletries on Sunday mornings from 6:30 to 8:30 a.m.



Breakfast Prep

Prepare for Sunday's Basement Church by cracking eggs, placing bacon in pans, etc. on Wednesdays. In this ministry volunteers participate to ensure breakfast will be ready every Sunday morning.

Clothes Closet

Organize, sort, and label clothing donations so our neighbors experiencing homelessness can find the items they need. Come anytime weekdays from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. for an hour or two.

Donations for Outreach

Donate much-needed men's jeans, shoes, and coats as well as sleeping bags and

blankets. Also Calvary's Little Library can use gently used books.

Emmanuel Center

Tutor, collect school supplies, or mentor the children of Emmanuel Center. The Emmanuel Center seeks to break the cycle of poverty through education and strengthening young minds, bodies, and spirits within a context of Christian witness. Each year Calvary volunteers host a carnival for the children and families of the Emmanuel Center.

Emmanuel Meal

Host, serve guests, and buy turkeys for close to 300 of our unsheltered neighbors for a Christmas luncheon on a Monday before Christmas.

Friends of the Mental Health Court

Attend Mental Health Court, provide incentives to participants, and advocate for the program. Defendants suffering from mental illness are given a chance to have their charges dropped in exchange for completing a year-long mental health treatment plan determined by the Shelby County Mental Health Court.

Grizzlies Prep

Be a Lunch Buddy by eating a 30-minute lunch weekly with a student. This mentoring relationship has proven to be

a valuable asset not only for the student but also for the volunteer. Grizzlies Prep is a Title I charter school providing education to young men in grades 5-8.

The Hospitality HUB + Work Local

Provide and drop off lunch once a month for 10 unsheltered people who work or support development efforts with communication and promotional work. The Hospitality Hub connects individuals with the resources they need to begin their journey out of homelessness. Work Local provides job access and blight reduction. The Hub transports job-seeking panhandlers to clean up sites where they help reduce urban blight while providing workers with lunch, a day's wages, and additional services.

Laptop Crew

Help our neighbors one-on-one with their paperwork or reading needs. Complete forms for food stamps, apply for stimulus check, locate family members, and more. Bring your laptop on Sunday mornings from 6:30-8:30 a.m.



Lives Worth Saving

Welcome, serve, host, and eat lunch with attendees. This ministry works with our police department and our district attorney to respond to trafficking and prostitution in our city by offering women a safe path to a new life. Second Thursday of each month.

MICAH

Attend evening meetings and keep our parish informed and involved with MICAH. Memphis Interfaith Coalition for Action and Hope (MICAH) provides community organizing with three initiatives: education, integration and intercultural equity, and economic equity. MICAH comprises over 50 churches and nonprofits.

MIFA (Memphis InterFaith Association)

Deliver nutritious meals through Meals on Wheels to homebound seniors. This ministry supports the independence of vulnerable seniors and families in crisis. Learn more at <u>mifa.org</u>.

Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense

Attend meetings, help with publicity, and keep Calvary informed of Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America, a grassroots movement of Americans fighting for public safety measures that can protect people from gun violence. Moms Demand Action campaigns for new and stronger solutions to lax gun laws and loopholes that jeopardize the safety of our families.

Pride Parade

Staff the Calvary booth at the Mid-South pride parade. Calvary believes that God loves everyone. No exceptions. With this in mind, we provide kindness and encouragement at the Mid-South Pride Parade, especially for those who don't have relationships with their families.

Refugees

Work with the Mariposa initiative, welcoming refugees at the bus terminal who are passing through Memphis or serving refugees who come to Memphis to meet with mobile consulates.

Room in the Inn

Prepare meals, host neighbors, and assist with logistics. This program is dedicated to serving people experiencing homelessness by providing emergency shelter and meals here at Calvary on Saturday nights during the coldest months of the year—November through March—sharing the love of God through hospitality. Thistle & Bee, Inc.

Purchase Thistle & Bee's famous granola and other products, including honey harvested from the T&B hives, at Cooper-Young Farmers Market, Curb Market, Highpoint Grocery, Babcock Gifts, The Dixon, novel, Cordelia's Market, and at various community events posted on the T&B Facebook page throughout the year. Other volunteer opportunities include gardening, beekeeping, event planning, marketing, fundraising, and more. All products are made by women employed by Thistle & Bee, who have survived sex trafficking and prostitution. Learn more at thistleandbee.org.

Acolytes

Acolyte means "one who serves." An acolyte assists in worship by carrying a processional cross, lighting candles, holding the Gospel book, carrying candles or "torches," assisting a deacon or priest set up and clean up at the altar, handing the offering plates to ushers, and many other tasks. Youth (grades 7–12) serve about once every three weeks. Adults serve every 5th Sunday. Participants arrive 20 minutes before the scheduled service. Training sessions are held before or after a service.

Altar Guild

The duty of the Altar Guild is to prepare all things necessary to conduct a worship service at Calvary with order and beauty. This quiet, behind-the-scenes work is a true gift to the entire congregation. The Altar Guild at Calvary is divided into teams that rotate each week with each team serving every 4th week. Preparation for a Sunday service takes about 30 minutes before the service and another 30 minutes to clean up after the service. There also are opportunities to serve for special services, including mid-week services, funerals, and weddings.

Eucharistic Ministers

Eucharistic Ministers (EMs) assist with the Eucharist on Sunday, at special Christmas and Holy Week services, and, occasionally, at weddings and funerals. It is a unique ministry, being involved with the congregation in a very personal way. New Eucharistic Ministers are required to attend a training that lasts approximately go minutes. Most EMs are scheduled for two Sunday services every six weeks.

Flower Guild

Flower Guild members arrange flowers each week on the altar and adorn the church for major feast days such as Christmas Day and Easter Day. Members are assigned every other month to arrange on either Friday or Saturday. New participants work with another team member until confident enough to work independently.

Greeters

Greeters are the first impression that parishioners and visitors have of Calvary. By their positive and welcoming greeting, they establish a pleasant atmosphere for those entering the building. Greeters are deployed to engage visitors in a warm and welcoming way after services on Sunday mornings. Greeters work approximately one Sunday a month before and after the 10:30 a.m. service.

Lectors

Lectors help lead worship by reading the appointed lessons for the day or leading the congregation in the prayers of the people (Intercessor). This ministry offers an opportunity to better understand the liturgy and tradition of the Church and often leads to greater knowledge of the scriptures. Training is required, and lectors typically serve once every 10 weeks.

Wedding Guild

The Wedding Guild assists couples planning to marry by acting as the church's representative. They attend rehearsals and weddings to help as needed.

Ushers

Calvary ushers assist parishioners and visitors in entering the nave for Sunday services and other special events. Specific duties include: collecting, counting, and recording the offering; counting attendance; cleaning-up pews after services; and ringing the tower bell. This ministry requires about 1-3/4 hours for the 10:30 a.m. worship service once every six weeks and one hour for the 8 a.m. worship service once every five weeks.

Front Desk

Calvary relies on parishioner volunteers to greet our guests and answer incoming calls every Wednesday and Friday and various other days throughout the year. Volunteer during church office hours from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and choose to work half-day or full-day shifts.

Communications Office

Communications at Calvary has many facets and is always looking for new volunteers! Whether you are a writer, photographer, or have marketing or design skills to offer, Robyn Banks would love your help! Time commitments vary from 30 minutes to 2 hours per week.

Finance Office

There are many volunteer opportunities in Calvary's finance office. From taking money at events to verifying deposit amounts, there is something for whatever time you have available to give. Time commitments vary from 30 minutes to 2 hours.

Pastoral Care Teams

The Pastoral Care Teams offer a ministry of prayer and care for Calvary parishioners and their families. Teams provide care on a rotating basis (every 5th week.) Care may include sending cards, making phone calls, delivering flowers, providing a meal, making visits, or other kinds of support as appropriate. Care Team Members attend a one-hour meeting every 5th week and spend 1–3 hours on their assignments. Total hours per month: 2–4 (includes team meeting).

Eucharistic Visitors

Eucharistic visitors are trained and licensed to share the bread and wine of the Eucharist with those who cannot leave their homes or hospital rooms. EVs function as part of Calvary's Care Teams and provide this ministry of care and prayer on an as-needed basis.
